

Moravian Music Sunday May 19, 2019 in celebration of the truth that Christ makes all things new!

Today, we thank God for the gift of music, a heart-felt expression of the faith, love, and hope that we share as brothers and sisters in Christ. Music often touches our hearts, gently moving past the defenses we raise with the spoken word; singing and playing music together, we are joined in Christian unity and challenged to show love to one another.

Through our music, old and new, we are reminded that we follow a Savior who does, indeed, make all things new. Through his life, sufferings, death, and resurrection, Jesus Christ brought about a new creation, defeating the age-old enemy, death, and inviting all of creation to share in new life forevermore. Today we may sing new songs written by living followers of Christ – it's easy then to celebrate the God who makes all things new! We are grateful that God gave us the gift of music, an audible form of comfort, celebration, and worship which connects us to our past, and binds us to one another, and to our God.
