The Twenty-Sixth Moravian Music Festival

... will be different from any Festival you've ever attended before! Because of ongoing concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic, the MMF Board of Trustees decided in the fall that the 26th Moravian Music Festival, scheduled for 18-24 July 2021, will be an all-virtual event. The Festival will feature a combination of live and pre-recorded worship opportunities, concerts, workshops and seminars, and lectures, as well as a separate program for children and youth. 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
Another new (to us) feature of this Festival will be the opportunity for Festival registrants to participate in a virtual choir or virtual band. Each large ensemble will have 3 or 4 pieces to learn (not all at once!). You'll receive detailed instructions on how to prepare your part, including recordings of the pieces, and you'll then record yourself using your phone or tablet, send in the file by a given deadline, and wait for the amazing results to be revealed during the Festival!

Recognizing that one of the major joys of a Moravian Music Festival is being together in fellowship, worship, and music-making, we're working hard on two ways to reach that goal: we'll provide ways for you to connect with other Festival registrants before, during, and after the Festival; and ... we'll plan to gather for a shorter in-person event, the "second half" of the 26th Moravian Music Festival, in Bethlehem in the summer of 2022! Choir and band members, then, will get to perform live the works they heard in virtual presentations in 2021!

All portions of this conference will be held online, through Zoom. This will include the Walter Vivian Moses Lecture in Moravian Studies on Tuesday, the concert presented by Moravian Music Foundation on Friday, the Keynote Lecture presented by Moravian Historical Society on Saturday, and all panels, performances, roundtables, and discussions.


The conference is sponsored by Moravian Archives, Moravian College, and Center for Moravian Studies, in partnership with Moravian Music Foundation, Moravian Theological Seminary, and Moravian Historical Society with additional funding generously provided by Bethlehem Area Moravians and Penn State University Press.

Registration for the Bethlehem Conference this year is FREE! You will have opportunity to make a donation to help offset the technology costs of the conference. But if you're not an historian or a scholar, why should you register? Because ONLY conference registrants will be able to experience a concert sponsored by the Moravian Music Foundation during the conference! It is a "closed" event, in that only if you register for this FREE conference will you receive a link to the concert (and all other conference events). The concert includes the Symphony No. 4 in Bb major, arranged for flute, violin, cello, and piano, found in the Philharmonic Society of Bethlehem collection; and the Trio No. 2 in D minor by Moravian composer John Antes (1740-1811). This is the 250th year of the birth of Beethoven, and so this concert honors "Beethoven in Bethlehem" by using a major work found in the Bethlehem collections!

And a reminder: HOW CAN YOU SEE THIS CONCERT? ONLY by registering for the Bethlehem Conference on Moravian History and Music! Who knows? You are likely to find the paper sessions and lectures engaging, and you might learn some new things!

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Moravian Music Sunday 2021:

Stand Up and Bless the Lord: Singing Our Faith with the Hymns of James Montgomery (1771-1854)



Since the timing of the return to in-person worship, and full-throated choral and congregational singing, is still uncertain, for Moravian Music Sunday this year we are not recommending choral music. Instead, we are focusing on the 250th birthday of renowned Moravian hymn-writer James Montgomery.

Montgomery was the son of Moravian minister John Montgomery. Born at Irvine, Ayrshire, Scotland on November 4, 1771, he moved with his parents when he was 5 to the Moravian settlement at Gracehill, Ireland. Two years later, he was sent to the Moravian school at Fulneck, England. His missionary parents died in the West Indies while he was in school.

After working for a while in retail, in 1792 he moved to Sheffield, England, at age 21 to serve as the assistant to the printer of the newspaper, the *Sheffield Register*. In 1794, when the newspaper's publisher left England to avoid political prosecution, Montgomery took over the paper, changed its name to *The Sheffield Iris*, and continued to edit it for thirty-one years. During the next two years he was imprisoned twice, first for reprinting a song in commemoration of the fall of the Bastille, and later for printing an account of a riot in Sheffield – an account which was not favorable to a military commander. He also protested against slavery, the lot of boy chimney sweeps, and lotteries.

His poetic and literary gifts were put to good use in editing his paper, writing and publishing poems and hymns, presenting lectures on poetry, and advocating for foreign missions and the Bible Society. He died in his sleep on April 30, 1854. A statue was erected to his memory in the Sheffield General Cemetery, and a stained glass window in the Parish Church. A Wesleyan chapel and a public hall are also named in his honor.

Montgomery wrote over 400 poems and hymns, and some 100 of these are still in use. The 1923 Moravian hymnal included 51 of his hymns, and the 1995 *Moravian Book of Worship* contains 20. Some of the most familiar Montgomery hymns? *Angels from the Realms of Glory; Come, Let Us Sing the Song of Songs; Go to Dark Gethsemane...*

For Moravian Music Sunday we have prepared an order of worship using 15 Montgomery hymns reflecting on the seasons of the church year. These hymns could be sung by a soloist or very small quartet (*socially distanced, and masked even while singing*); or the texts could be read aloud, with or without the tunes playing in the background. Our Sapphire Anniversary (... but the socks are NOT blue!)

Sixty-five years ago, on 1 May 1956, the

Moravian Music Foundation was chartered as a nonprofit corporation in the state of North Carolina. Since that time, we've moved our office and Southern Province collections twice (from the basement of the archives building to 20 Cascade Avenue in 1963, and from Cascade Avenue to the Archie Davis Center in 2001); we've moved the Northern Province collections



once (to the new archives building in 1978). We've created a state-of-the-art card catalog (1960s-70s), microfilmed the entire collection (1990s), built a state-of-the-art archival facility with the Southern Province Archives and the Salem Congregation

(2001), produced nearly countless published editions and recordings, and are nearing completion of a state-of-the-art online catalog. We've participated in 22 Moravian Music Festivals (the first three were held before our incorporation, and the 26th is coming this summer), helped with uncountable concerts, been of assistance to so many church musicians and choirs ...

Our 65th anniversary coincides with Moravian Music Sunday, May 2, so we're going to celebrate by inviting you to give a

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Those of you who've been following the Moravian Music Foundation for some time will be aware of the ongoing *GemeinKat* project – converting the more-than-50,000 cards in our card catalog to electronic, online records accessible world-wide! We actually started planning this project and doing some work "in the background" almost 15 years ago, but it was only seven years ago that we were able to move "full-speed-ahead" with the project. It was fall of 2014 when Barbara Strauss and Dave Blum joined our staff to tackle this project, and now we can't imagine the Foundation without them! Great strides have been made, and we're looking both backwards and forwards to see what we've done, and what remains to be done. By far the majority of the cataloging work is complete, but both Dave and Barbara are in the throes of completing some large collections.

Why, you wonder, if the collection was already cataloged on cards, is it taking so long? It's because they're not just converting existing information to online records; they're updating and enhancing the information through research that wasn't available fifty years ago. Dave and Barbara have been able to identify a great many pieces that were previously listed as "anonymous" or "unidentified"; they've moved a few things around to get all the parts to a piece together; and all in all the project has greatly enhanced the body of knowledge about Moravian music! Watch for updates about the fruits of this project – it's far more than just stuff on the World Wide Web!

- You can *designate the Moravian Music Foundation as the beneficiary* for a retirement plan, life insurance policy, or other assets.
- You can set up a *life income gift* such as a charitable gift annuity or charitable remainder unitrust.
- You can set up a *donor-advised fund* that can provide you with immediate tax benefits while making your charitable giving easier for years to come.
- You can give *appreciated stock* which you have owned for more than a year; with careful planning, you can reduce capital gains tax while supporting the Moravian Music Foundation.
- You can make a gift of retirement assets, such as an employee retirement plan, IRA, or tax-sheltered annuity;
 this can shield your heirs from taxes while supporting the Moravian Music Foundation.
