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
Celebrating

Let Us Walk

SATB choir, oboe (or any C instrument), and piano or organ

Composer: Cathy Hamner

Music Editors: Dirk French and Nola Knouse Text: Based on Galatians 5:22-25

A beautiful work using a beautiful text, Let Us Walk is suited for any occasion but especially for a special day recognizing someone or for common unity within the church. The piece incorporates the use of an oboe that really decorates the piece. While the piece calls for an oboe, any C instrument (violin or flute) will work. The piece has a simple accompaniment and easier rhythms while remaining a solid, beautiful piece. It is perfect for any sized choir that incorporates SATB voices. The range is well within the soprano vocal range with the highest note raising F# (hint: this would be perfect for an aging choir). The anthem is also suited for those choirs that do not read music that well - the harmonies are beautiful but yet not difficult to learn. Given the flow of the phrases, texts and dynamics, this is a piece that every choir can make their own - it lends itself to your own interpretation. Have fun and enjoy this piece with vour choir!

Worship and the environment \dots Did you ever think about the environmental impact of church bulletins? Let's do the math and see just what's up \dots

If you print	using 8 ½ x 11 inch sheets	you'll use this many pieces of paper per year:
100 bulletins per week	1 (4 pages, folded)	5,200
	2 (8 pages, folded)	10,400
	3 (12 pages, folded)	15,600
	4 (16 pages, folded)	20,800

Surely we don't print a 16-page bulletin, you think. But if you have a whole page – 4 sides – of announcements, plus printing liturgical materials or songs, perhaps you do! The number of pages can be disguised by the use of different colors of paper, etc. ... but the number of sheets of paper used is still staggering.

Now, those numbers are large enough ... but what if you print 200 bulletins a week? or even more? And this doesn't include special services, lovefeast odes, etc., etc.

Consider ... the *Moravian Book of Worship* is 954 pages. If you're doing even one 8 ½ x 11 inch insert of music each week, for 100 copies, you're printing the equivalent of 5 hymnals per year!

So, is the solution to project everything? That's an easy answer ... but consider whether you may be excluding persons from full participation in worship. Not only the moderately visually impaired (folks who can function normally but simply can't read from a distance; there are more of us than you think!), but also someone who has difficulty standing, or who has sprained an ankle and needs to remain seated during the service.

In the humble opinion of your editor, the *Moravian Book of Worship* is the most inclusive, and environmentally friendly, resource we have at hand for our worship! And the contents of the book are certainly diverse, to allow for many types of services using a wide variety of types of music. Give it another look!

The 24th Moravian Music Festival July 14-20, 2013

2013? How far away is THAT? ... Not as far as you think!

We're under 24 months away from the 24th Moravian Music Festival, and it's not too soon to begin planning to come! Seems like all our calendars get more and more crowded these years, and it's important to block out the times that ARE important to you.

What we know now about this Festival is pretty wonderful! We know that **JOHN SINCLAIR** will be our Festival choral conductor. Continuing his active involvement in Moravian music, since the last Festival (2009) John has conducted the recording *Loveliest Immanuel: Moravian Sacred Solos*, with soprano Sharla Nafziger and the Bach Festival Chamber Orchestra of Winter Park; he has finalized plans to record a CD of Moravian sacred duets this fall, to be released sometime this coming winter; and he has begun plans with us to record a second CD of Moravian anthems. We're excited that this may bring the total to *three* CD's of Moravian music John has conducted since the 2009 Festival!

And we know that **ALLEN FRANK** will be our Festival band conductor. Those who participated in the 2007 Unity Brass Festival in South Africa became familiar with Allen's excellence as a conductor and teacher, paired with a quick wit and lively intelligence. And those who played in the Festival band in 2009 also experienced Allen's work as Assistant Band Director there. Who knows what music Allen will dig out for 2013?



And we know that **DON KEMMERER** will be our Festival trombone choir director. Don's expertise in the area of trombone choirs is something all of us can be very proud of. Don continues to lead the Bethlehem Area Moravian Trombone Choir and is also working with a smaller group of players on more difficult music for trombone ensemble.

And we know that **SUSAN FOSTER** will be our Festival rehearsal accompanist and organist. Susan is the organist at Home Moravian Church in Winston-Salem. She is a specialist in early music performance and is a wonderful recitalist, service organist, and accompanist—on organ, piano, and

harpsichord. We're thrilled to have her on the Festival staff!

And we know that there's something different about the **DAILY SCHEDULE** for the coming Festival. We've listened to folks who lament the lack of a specified time in the schedule for the trombone choir to rehearse; and we remember the joy of wandering around Belmont Abbey and hearing "pick-up" instrumental chamber groups; and so what we're planning is this ... In lieu of some of the "morning seminars", there will be a special time set aside when participants can choose to participate in (a) trombone choir; (b) chamber music; or (c) handbells. That means that you can be in the choir and handbells; or in the band and chamber music; or in both the choir and trombone choir; etc., etc., etc., etc., etc. – without having to squeeze in trombone choir rehearsal during the breaks. That means this Festival will have "less talkin', more playin'!"

And we know we're working towards a **CHILDREN'S PROGRAM** to include Bible school and musical activities. We're assembling a dynamite team of leaders for this program!

And we know there's a whole lotta work for Festival chair **BECKY OWENS AND HER FIRECRACKER COMMITTEE** to do – but there's so much to look forward to, and seeing **YOU** in Bethlehem is one of the best things!

How far is it to Bethlehem? **NOT VERY FAR!!!!** Make your plans now for 2013! (and check the Festival website frequently for updates ... <u>www.MoravianMusicFestival.org!</u>)

A grand time was had by all at the Midwest MusicFest featuring Moravian music, hosted by the Lake Mills Moravian Church, Lake Mills, Wisconsin, July 20-24, 2011! Some 60 participants sang in the choir, learning some newly-edited pieces and re-learning some old favorites, working with conductor John V. Sinclair. Vocal soloists Julia Foster and Paul Rowe thrilled us with the sensitivity and beauty of their solos and duets, and also conducted vocal techniques clinics for the participants. MusicFest chair Kathy Wendt conducted a handbells workshop, where the players worked hard on hymns and on Cynthia Dobrinski's challenging and thrilling setting of *Sing Hallelujah*, *Praise the Lord* (which was




