Directions at moravianmusic.org/ contact-us/ Over 600 years ago, Jan Hus began implementing his reforms in the Catholic churches of Moravia and Bohemia. One of his initiatives was to encourage the congregational singing of hymns in the native Czech language. Moravians continue to value the ability to express their love of Christ, faith in God, and care for each other by creating, sharing, and listening to quality, meaningful music.

In 2016, the Moravian Music Foundation celebrates 60 years of work, encompassing the comprehensive discovery, assembly, preservation, catalog, research, edition, publication, and performance of the Moravian musical heritage.

Had we listened to the Rev. Francis F. Hagen, organist and composer, the Foundation might be much older. In 1878, he questioned: *Ought we not to make the attempt to preserve, to ourselves and to others, these precious musical treasures?*

He was speaking of the collected 18th and early 19th century music, written by Moravians and others. The rediscovery of this music forms a vital link in the history of American music and culture.

The first editions were not produced until 1939, by Hans T. David. Further investigation during the 1930's and 1940's revealed the quantity and quality of the music, and the variety of composers represented in the Moravian collections.

Working with American Moravian conductor, Thor Johnson, a group in Bethlehem organized an "Early American Moravian Music Festival and Seminar" on June 26-July 2, 1950. Out of this same energy, came the founding of The Moravian Music Foundation in 1956, and extensive re-

search, editing, and publishing began. The critical process of cataloging the treasure holdings began in the 1960's into the 1970's, supported by foundation grants.

Thanks to a bequest, MMF holdings may now be searched online at moravianmusic.on.worldcat.org/discovery. The catalog continues to grow as the Foundation publishes more anthems, both old and newly-composed, and acquires more col-

lections. MMF re-edits and publishes out-of-print favorite anthems, and produces new instrumental sheet music and high quality sound recordings.

Raleigh Camerata

The Moravian Music Foundation presented the Raleigh Camerata, in partnership with the Carolina Chamber Symphony Players and Calvary Moravian Church, on a beautiful Sunday afternoon, January 31, 2016, in Winston-Salem, NC.

The ensemble carefully selected pieces by Moravian composers, and music that may exist only in the Moravian Music Foundation's collections. The Camerata's members play replicas of Baroque and



Classical instruments, and perform with style and technique informed by historical treatises and research.

In a review for CVNC, Nicholas Rich writes, "the Camerata offered a valuable perspective on the repertoire. Bowed gut strings have a magical sound, somewhat less robust than steel, but more transparent. The overtones seem always just on the verge of breaching the sonic surface, creating a shimmering and multi-hued timbre.

He continues, "the highlight of the concert was Ignaz Pleyel's Quartet No. 1 in G, originally for standard string quartet and arranged here by François Devienne for flute and strings... The

ending of the second movement,... was the very pinnacle of musicianship. I thought I could hear and feel every mote of dust floating in Calvary Moravian as the players softly repeated the closing chord. The closing Rondo punctuated the concert with lively elegance, and the audience didn't hesitate to jump up and express their enthusiasm. Historically-informed performance can be an adventure, but it's one well worth taking. Bravi!"

Assistant Director Visits Nepal

On December 27, along with nine members of the Lake Auburn and Waconia Moravian Churches (Minnesota), Gwyn Michel left for a 10-day visit to Nepal. After two days of travel, they finally arrived at the Kathmandu airport and were immediately enveloped in beautiful silk scarves and brotherly love by Moravian brothers and sisters. While in Nepal, the team led six days of a 10-day Winter Camp at the International Kindergarten, held a one-day Vacation Bible School for the Nepalese congregations, and conducted one-day workshops for church musicians and leaders of the congregations. Gwyn writes:

Our time was filled to overflowing with joyous music, singing, dancing, study, and worship. A concern before the trip was what impact our group would have on scarce resources in a country not only trying to recover from the devastating April 2015 earthquake, but also dealing with a crippling fuel crisis.

Thanks to the resourcefulness and gracious hospitality of our Nepalese brothers and sisters, however, these factors had little impact on our programming. Like the five wise bridesmaids in Matthew 25, our hosts had stockpiled fuel and supplies for our visit, anticipating our every need.

Lift Your Heart, Be Joyful (Freue dich und sey fröhlich)

Lift Your Heart, Be Joyful was edited by Nola Reed Knouse and Heather Mitchell from manuscript copies in the Congregation Collections from Salem, Lititz, and Nazareth, and the

Johannes Herbst Collection.

The text derives from Zech. 2:14; Ps. 68:5, Deut. 31:6, Isa. 65:24 It is appropriate for general use, for New Years, All Saints, Advent, or Reign of Christ.

Christian Gregor (1723-1801) has been called the "father of Moravian music." He was born in Silesia and joined the Moravian Church when he was seventeen. He served the church as organist and minister and held important positions as a church administrator, visiting Pennsylvania and North Carolina in that capacity in 1770-1772. He was consecrated a bishop in 1789. Gregor edited the hymnal of 1778 and the chorale book of 1784, and he composed several hundred other works—over 1100 manuscripts of Gregor's music are preserved in the American collections. He died in Berthelsdorf on November 6, 1801.

Available from the Moravian Music Foundation!

A Moravian Celebration, by Winston-Salem composer Wade Peeples, is a monumental organ work for advanced organists. Commissioned for the 2003 celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Southern Province, Moravian Church in America, this three-movement opus is based on hymn tunes.

- 1. The first movement is itself a triptych (*Introduction, Fantasy, and Fugue*) which opens with a bold pedal statement of *COVENANT* (Grace and Peace from God, Our Blessed Savior). The Fantasy weaves together snippets of six Moravian hymn tunes: *HAYN* (Jesus Makes My Heart Rejoice), *BECHLER* (Sing Hallelujah, Praise the Lord), *PILGRIMAGE* (Welcome Among Your Flock of Grace), *BERTHELSDORF* (Own Your Congregation), *CONFESSION* (What Brought Us Together), and *COVENANT* before boldly launching into a rousing six-page fugue on *BECHLER* (Sing Hallelujah, Praise the Lord).
- 2. The middle movement is a delightful set of variations on *HAYN* (Jesus Makes My Heart Rejoice),
- 3. The final movement is a medley of three tunes: *HOLY LORD* (Holy Lord, Holy Lord), *CHURCH REJOICE* (Church Rejoice! Raise Your Voice), and *CASSEL* (Christian Hearts, in Love United) which can be performed either by organ alone or with an obbligato instrument (trumpet).
