Celebrating... Sing, O Ye Heavens! A CD of Moravian Choral Music

MMF is proud to announce a joyful partnership with the Bach Festival Society of Winter Park, Florida, to produce a new recording of Moravian choral music and solo arias!

The Winter Park Bach Festival in February will feature an evening of Moravian choral and solo music, accompanied by orchestra. Recording sessions will take place during the following week. The conductor is Dr. John V. Sinclair, well-known to Moravian-music lovers as the continuing conductor of Moravian Music Festivals. The CD is projected for release in late summer, possibly even sooner.

In our planning for the CD, John and I nicknamed it our "Moravian Greatest Hits" project. Over the past four years or so, we've talked many times about just which of our many lovely "tunes" should be recorded. And – not all of the "Greatest Hits" were discovered in the 1950's or earlier – we're still finding them, and a couple of them just received their first modern performance within the past 10 years! These include:

- Freydt, *I Am the Shepherd* (solo; 1999 Moravian Music Festival)
- Herbst, None Among Us (1999 Moravian Music Festival)

- LaTrobe, *By Your Meritorious Death* (2003 Moravian Music Festival)
- Löwe, O Most Gracious, Welcome Child (1996 Moravian Music Festival)
- Peter, Let Everyone Have the Same Mind (duet; 1999 Moravian Music Festival)

Many of the already-familiar works on the recording have been newly edited for this concert and recording. While this work might seem puzzling, it was necessary because of the evolution of music editorial practices over the past 60 years. (See "Music Editing" on page 3.) These include the following "hits":

- Wolf, Glory to Him

I know someone is reading this and saying, "But my favorite "hit" isn't here!" We know. We couldn't include everything. We'll just have to work towards a second volume – "Even More Greatest Hits"!

For this concert and recording, the Bach Festival Society will be augmented by a small group of Moravian singers from around the country – we wish we could have included everyone, but rehearsal time and performance space do impose limitations – and by students from Rollins College, where John Sinclair is also choral conductor. The Rollins students will sing 3 or 4 works alone.

The CD will be offered in our catalog as soon as it becomes available. The regular price will be \$16 plus shipping and applicable taxes. We are taking pre-orders until April 1 at a discounted price of \$14 per CD, which *includes* shipping and taxes.

Preserving... Music Editing An Evolving Discipline

Most of the music in Moravian collections survives in sets of performance parts, sometimes several sets in different collections with different instrumental parts! There are full scores for very few of these works – probably about 1100 out of some 10,000 works – and some of these scores don't include <u>all</u> of the parts. (For instance, most of the wonderful scores copied by Johannes Herbst do not have the organ part, even when the surviving parts do include a part for organ. One can speculate that Brother Herbst did not include the organ if it didn't add unique material to the music, but this is only speculation.)

The first task in editing a piece for performance today, then, is to create a full score out of the surviving parts. In by far the majority of works, there are only minimal problems here – next-to-no missing measures, very few copying errors, very few illegible notes or rhythms. Moravian composers and copyists were quite meticulous in their work!

In the early 1990's MMF worked with a group of scholars, including Dr. Walter Gray from the North Carolina School of the Arts and Dr. David Levy from Wake Forest University, to craft a policy for music editing. Under the leadership of Philip Dunigan, we wrestled with questions like these: What aspects of a piece would be "corrected"? Would we modernize rhythmic notations, clefs, and text spellings? Would we "regularize" slurrings, if, for instance, groups of eighth notes were slurred in violin 1, viola, and cello, but similar groups were <u>not</u> slurred in the second violin part? How would we choose to translate texts?

We studied scholarly editions that have been published over the past 60 years, and noted an evolution towards simplicity and a reduced level of editorial emendations, and decided that MMF would move in that direction, and "push the envelope".

We came up with a 2-page policy that can be summarized in a single statement: *The composer knew what he/she wanted.* We will <u>not</u> correct parallel fifths between parts (the bane of the freshman/sophomore music theory student!). We will <u>not</u> re-voice a work from SSAB to SATB. In general we will <u>not</u> regularize articulations (on occasion we will add dotted slurs). In any edition it will be transparent what indications were the composer's and what (if any) were added by the editor.

We will translate the text into modern singable English, and we will not "fix" the text to make it more palatable. Insofar as possible our translations will use the same rhythm, meter, and rhyme scheme (if any) as the original German text.

You can see the implications of these choices for earlier editions. Many of the editions published in the 1950's and 1960's made different choices, re-voicing anthems to SATB, re-writing the texts if the original seemed unpalatable (people in the 1950's did <u>not</u> like talking about "Jesus' blood"), and "fixing" part-writing imperfections. For the purpose of this new recording, the editions used represent the original intentions of the composers to the best of our ability now.

And we know that as time passes, other manuscript copies may be found – which may indicate that some years down the road, even "newer" editions may be needed. Such is the work of scholarship, and such is the joy of this music!

Celebrating... An Advent Singstunde In the Old Chapel, Bethlehem, PA

About 65 people gathered in the Old Chapel of Central Moravian Church in Bethlehem, PA on December 13th for an evening of song and fellowship. The setting of that quiet place of worship drew the gatherers into a worshipping community quickly and the singing of *Once He Came in Blessing* worked its anticipatory charm. Non-Moravian visitors from Harrisburg, PA noted afterwards that this was their first Moravian worship experiences and they drove home reliving a good evening.

Hymns were drawn from the *Moravian Advent and Christmas Hymns* book and traced the theology of the seasons with hymns from the Ancient Unity, Herrnhut, Bethlehem, Great Britain and some anonymous texts. Perhaps the highlight of the evening was the simultaneous singing of Hosanna/Hosianna in both English and German. About fifteen German-language singers sang the first part while the English singers answered with part two. Christian Gregor would have been proud.

The break from the busyness of the season was much appreciated and the depth of joy nowhere better expressed than in the final stanza –

With awe and deeply bowed, we praise th'incarnate God Who took our flesh and blood;

Unto the Child at Bethlehem, whose birth th'angelic choirs proclaim,

We our thank offerings bring, and grateful sing Praise to our heav'nly King.

Letters Home: Excerpts from a Soldier's Letters Home to Salem

Continued from Newsletter 21-4

April 3 [1863] Good Friday morning

I wonder how you all do on this holy day. One thing I know, you don't hear such sounds as we are listening to on this morning. Ever since I opened my eyes on this morning, I can hear the heavy discharges of artillery towards Washington [NC].

Saturday morning 10 o'clock [April 4 1963]

Disagreeable morning, the wind blowing terribly cold, just a grosser Sabbath [Great Sabbath, as Moravians call the day before Easter] as we had some years ago...Soon Easter will have passed and we have seen nothing of it. It is not observed here at Greenville. If I could be with you in the morning, I would give a heap. I expect we shall blow our church tunes that we generally blow. I'll think of you at home in the morning if ever I did. And I know you'll think of us.

Easter Sunday morning 6 o'clock [April 5, 1863]

We got up about 5 this morning and played church tunes, 185, 132, 230, and 151, such as we had. I guess you are eating breakfast just now. I wish I could take it with you.

Hanover Junction May 18, 1863, Monday aft.

Dear Sister, This morning after guard mounting Gust [Reich] and myself walked up to the depot to get a paper. The Richmond train having arrived just as we got there, I looked around to get a paper when all at once I came across Julius Leinbach and H. Siddall...In the train J.L. and H.S. came in, Gen. Lee and Gen. Stuart were likewise. I had a good view of Lee. He is a grey headed man, much older looking than I expected to see, stout built...They were on their way to Fredericksburg. They had been down to Richmond, I guess to consult with [President Jefferson] Davis or the War Department. I wish they would conclude to stop the war and make a compromise...

May 20 [1863]

So old father Zevely is dead too. Was he struck dead or did he linger some time yet after he was taken? So one after the other drops off at home. It seems death is busy everywhere and Charley Clauder, I suppose, was killed in recent battle on the Rappahannoc. Poor fellow. He is the first Salem boy that sacrificed his life in this accursed war. I'm afraid the young boys will be thin[n]ed out more and more and it will be like it was after the French Revolution—a curiosity to see a young man...

MMF News and Notes

- AVAILABILITY OF MORAVIAN BRASS MUSIC ~ *The Moravian Brass Duet Book* and two volumes of sonatas by Weber for 2 trumpets and 2 trombones, previously published by the Brass Press, are now again available through Editions BIM in Switzerland (www.editions-bim.com). Teachers, the duets are for two treble instruments and could be used for 2 horns or trumpets (or even 2 clarinets or flutes!). The quartets are accessible and tuneful, appropriate for preludes and offertories as well as concert performance. *Many thanks to Andreas Marx for bringing this to our attention!*
- ♪ With a very generous gift from MMF Honorary Trustee Virginia Howard, we will plan to take some of our most important manuscripts in the Northern collection to the Northeast Document Conservation Center for **conservation treatment** in 2007. These include the Peter String Quintets, which are in such fragile condition that we no longer can show them to visitors. We hope this can begin this spring. Not only will this provide for the stability and survival of these specific manuscripts; this will serve as a "pilot project" for other conservation work needed for the Northern collections, enabling us to estimate the funding and time needed, for future grant proposals.
- ▶ Keep an ear out around the country this year, for MMF board member and bass singer **Alex Helsabeck**. He is doing a series of concerts, all of which will feature a set of Moravian solos. If you get the chance to hear him, don't miss it!
- ♪ MMF continues to offer "unpublished" anthems in new editions. For a one-time fee of \$10 you will receive a clean copy of the anthem, licensed for you to copy for your church's music library. At this time of year you might consider the following:
 - ➤ K. H. Graun, *Christ By His One Sacrifice*. Many of you will remember this lovely anthem from Graun's *A Lamb Goes Forth*, sung at the 1992 Moravian Music Festival (that edition had the translation "Christ completes his sacrifice").
 - > C. I. LaTrobe, *By Your Meritorious Death*. The solo soprano (or tenor) part could easily be adapted to remove the high A's.
 - ➤ W. A. Mozart, *Wounded Lamb! By Your Self-Offering*. You'll recognize the music as Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus*, but with an anonymous 18th-century Moravian text.
 - ➤ J.F. Peter, *Blest Are Those Who Jesus' Suffering*. This is a new edition of "Blessed Are They" by Peter with a new translation: "Blest are those who Jesus' suff'ring as their call to grace perceive; blest who, finding God's pure off'ring, their eternal joy receive...."
 - ▶ Peter Wolle, *Now Rest in Peace*. This is a lovely anthem for Good Friday or Great Sabbath
- Some 75 people met at New Philadelphia Moravian Church on Saturday, January 27, for a **Moravian band reading session and workshop**, focusing on tunes for Lent and Easter as well as general-occasion tunes. Nola Knouse was the workshop leader, and enjoyed the fellowship and music of players from as far away as Maryland. We're delighted to report that Leaksville Moravian Church sent fully half their band to this event we hope to see the other half at the


